



The College Access, Retention and Success (CARS) Conference was held in the Wichita State Rhatigan Student Center on February 21, 2017. Approximately 65 people attended the morning event that was held in conjunction with National TRIO Day.

McNair Scholars Program Director, LaWanda Holt-Fields, presided over the event and introduced Associate Vice President for Student Affairs and Director of Special Programs, Deltha Q. Colvin, who welcomed the audience and talked about the importance of TRIO and GEAR UP.

Dr. Holt-Fields presented a session on grit as it relates to adults and successful strategies that enhance college preparedness for individuals who have been out of school for a long time. Holt-Fields and Kennedy Musamali, EdD spoke about the impact of students who will change the college landscape. According to the presenters, in 20 years over 50 percent of students will be from minority groups and most of those students will be first-generation college students. Dr. Holt-Fields, Souriya-Mnirajd, and Corinne Nilsen discussed characteristics of high achieving students, in particular, foster care students and students with disabilities.
